






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His Holiness Dalai Lama being greeted by dignitaries attending the Global Buddhist Summit upon his arrival. Credit: L Kooi Fong

Modi and Dalai Lama Helm Global Buddhist Summit Promoting Peace

NEW DELHI, 23 April 2023 (IDN | Buddhist Channel | Buddhistdoor) — A major Buddhist gathering in the Indian capital held on 20 and 21 April designed to emphasise human solidarity and global peace was helmed with major speeches by the Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Tibetan Buddhist spiritual leader His Holiness the Dalai Lama.

The two-day Global Buddhist Summit organised by the Delhi-based International Buddhist Confederation (IBC) was themed "Responses to Contemporary Challenges: Philosophy to Praxis." Attended by over 500 delegates from India and overseas, it had panel discussions and workshops that explored how the Buddha Dhamma's (teaching's) fundamental values can provide inspiration and guidance in contemporary settings.

When he walked into the hall, PM Modi—a Hindu—paid homage to the Buddha by offering flowers to a statue of Gautama Buddha before taking his seat alongside IBC Secretary General Venerable Dr Dhammapiya, Union Minister for Culture Kishan Reddy and Union Minister for Law and Justice

Kiren Rijiju.

In a keynote speech which was delivered off the cuff, Modi showed his dedication and keenness in sharing India's ongoing efforts towards preserving Buddhist heritage sites in

the country and establishing centres of Buddhist learning and research. He also emphasized the importance of promoting values such as compassion, non-violence, and peaceful co-existence, which are at the core of Buddhism, to address global challenges and create a better world for future generations.

He said, "The noble teachings of Gautam(a) Buddha have impacted countless people over centuries", and inspired by these teachings "India is taking new initiatives for global welfare".

The Prime Minister credited the teachings of the Buddha for the inherent empathy in India with regard to humanitarian issues. He mentioned peace missions and India's whole-hearted efforts in rescue work for disasters like the recent earthquake in Türkiye. Platforms like IBC, he continued, are giving the opportunity to like-minded and like-hearted countries to spread Buddha Dhamma and peace.

The government has lavishly funded the IBC and sees this event as an excellent opportunity to develop its "soft power" by embracing the positive values of Buddhism. With its image as a rising world superpower, India also has the advantage of being the land of the Buddha. These are advantages which other prominent Buddhist countries such as Thailand and Sri Lanka do not have.

About 170 International Delegates from more than 30 different countries of the world participated in the Global Buddhist Summit. But there were no delegates from China, which claims to have the world's biggest Buddhist population numbering over 200 million.

On the second day of the Summit, the Dalai Lama was an honoured guest who gave a keynote address. Earlier on the first day, the conference was told that his presence was uncertain because of ill health. But he did turn up with Ven Dr Dhammapiya extending a warm welcome to His Holiness.

Before introducing the Dalai Lama, Ven Dr Dhammapiya highlighted the previous day's discussions, which covered various Buddhist traditions that have evolved worldwide, comparing these traditions to different coloured flowers that grow from the same stalk. He said that this is the teaching of Buddha Shakyamuni, pointing out that the Buddha gave different teachings to different people based on their capacity and location.

In a half-an-hour address at the summit, the Dalai Lama focused on the concepts of compassion, wis dom, and dependent origination as espoused by the Buddha. "One thing that defines the Buddha's teaching," he declared, "is his explanation of dependent arising. This gives us an insight into reality. Everything is dependent. Nothing is independent. Things arise in dependence on other factors. Since nothing is independent, everything comes about through dependent relationships".

"Why is understanding dependent arising important?" asked the Dalai Lama, and then answered the question himself. "(It is) because when we don't have this insight, we grasp at self as something substantial and real. This, in turn, can lead to our drawing distinctions between 'us' and 'them' that feed conflict. We develop an attachment to those like us and aversion to others who we see as different".

He emphasised that compassion is at the heart of the Buddha's teaching. "The heart of the Buddha's teaching is a combination of compassion and wisdom, and as Buddhists, our task is to cultivate these two qualities", he advised, adding, "Many of the problems we face are to do with how we view reality. As Buddhists we need to pay attention to the process by which we grasp at the reality of things".

"Rituals are not important," he continued. "What we need is the cultivation of resting and analytical meditation, an understanding of reality and the practice of compassion". He pointed out that compassion enables one to transform adversity into opportunity, and it is important that study and investigation drive human endeavour and not dependence on blind faith.

Venerable Dr Ashin Nyanissara speaking virtually from Myanmar, also emphasized the significance of nurturing a benevolent heart that embodies qualities of love, compassion, and forgiveness. He observed that if people lack inner peace, it will be impossible to achieve peace in the world. He recommended the cultivation of insight meditation as a path towards world peace.

Prof Robert Thurman, a former student of the Dalai Lama, representing the academic study of Buddhism, recalled Modi's statement during the summit that India has a history of commitment to 'ahimsa', or non-violence. This concept is vital in understanding why individuals may choose to die instead of taking life.

The approach to education developed by great Indian universities such as Nalanda allowed individuals to understand the nature of reality and how to transform the mind. The core curriculum of Nalanda has been preserved in monasteries such as Ganden, Drepung, and Sera, which have been re-established in South India, he pointed out.

Reinforcing Prime Minister Narendra Modi's message at the Summit a day earlier, the Summit recognized that environmental degradation was one of the most pressing challenges facing humanity today. The members committed to protect the environment and promote sustainable development.

The Summit which was organised by International Buddhist Confederation and the Ministry of Culture, saw the participation of more than 500 delegates, around 175 were from overseas representing 31 countries. As the theme, "Responses to Contemporary Challenges: Philosophy to Praxis" generated informed and intense discussions, it was decided to host the Global Buddhist Summit annually, to take the dialogue on several of the challenging issues forward.

The texts, doctrines and philosophy of Buddha Dhamma were best guide for inter-faith dialogue, harmony and universal peace, the Declaration noted, in the context of the present world scenario. "The human race has been in great need to be free from conflict, ill-feeling, greed, selfishness and uncertainty of life. We are in dire need of peace and harmony both, in our personal life and at the global level", the Buddha most suited to show the path.

The focus of the GBS was on modes of disseminating and internalizing universal values and to find ways to work together, to address the burning challenges both within and globally and offer a sustainable model for future of the world.

Pea ce being the foundation for human happiness and well-being, and that conflicts and violence were a significant threat to it, the Summit called upon all nations, organizations and individuals to work towards creating a world free from conflict, violence and war.

There was general agreement that the Buddha's message could provide inspiration and guidance for Peace, Well-being, Harmony and Compassion, this needed to be highlighted and worked upon.

The Declaration also called upon governments to preserve and protect the sacred sites of Buddhism and promote their accessibility to people of all backgrounds.

Buddhist pilgrimage was a living heritage promoting spiritual growth, cultural understanding and social harmony.

Minister of State for Culture Mr Arjun Meghwal, while referring to the speech by the Honourable Prime Minister the previous day, mentioned that India had given the world the Buddha and not war or conflict. He referred to the several ways and means of attaining happiness as explained by the Buddha and emphasised on the need for people to focus on one's bare necessities rather than aspire for more, which is at the core of all problems. He mentioned about climate change and the need for every individual to consciously try and realise as to how he can help in preventing damage to the environment. In this connection, Mr Meghwal mentioned that he often rides a bicycle to send a message to people. Sh Meghwal also highlighted India's rich philosophical and spiritual heritage where one can find solution to all problems and Buddhism is part of this overall ecosystem. He thanked all the delegates for coming to the event and making the event a major success.

Members of the Sangha, the diplomatic community, distinguished Buddhist

scholars, dhamma practitioners all participated in the Summit. "All the presentations were very enlightening and revealed the various facets of Buddha Dhamma in very simple and lucid manner, said His Eminence Kyabje Yongzin Ling Rinpoche Tenzin Lungtok Thinley Choephak in his concluding remarks.

He emphasized that it is the responsibility of each one of us to spread the teachings of the Buddha, especially to the youth of today. Education should be imparted on the universal truth of the dhamma that was taught in the ancient Mahaviharas, like Nalanda.

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

A major reason for the same is that Buddhism as a culture and religious system has been firmly rooted in the ideas of peace and non-violence.

Its teachings emphasize the importance of compassion, kindness, and respect for all living beings. In today's era of war and conflict, Buddhism's message of peace and non-violence is more relevant than ever.

Religion offers a unique perspective on dealing with violence and conflict, emphasizing the importance of dialogue and understanding rather than aggression and force.

The principles of Buddhism also denote that violence and suffering inflicted on others ultimately come back to harm the oppressor as well.

This summit comes close on the heels of a recently-held successful international meet of experts from the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) nations, aimed at re-establishing transcultural links, seeking out commonalities, between Buddhist art of Central Asia, art styles, archaeological sites and antiquity in various museums' collections of the SCO countries as well.

This summit is a similar effort towards engaging the global Buddhist dhamma leadership and scholars on matters of Buddhist and universal concerns, and coming up with policy inputs to address them collectively.

With the powerful message of hope in the face of conflict that Buddhism philosophy propounds advertently and inadvenently, its teachings have constantly focused on the importance of compassion and forgiveness, even in the face of the greatest adversity.

By enhibracing these values, Buddhism advocates for a break in the cycle of violence resulting in a more peaceful and just world. It is expected that the deliberations at the summit will successfully explore how the Buddha Dhamma's fundamental values can provide the necessary inspiration and guidance to individuals, leaders and society in general in today's day and age to grapple with technological advancements, consumerism and the constant aggrandisement that societies and nations continue to profess and practice.

The maiden edition of the Global Buddhist Summit that is held in New Delhi marks a significant moment in the history of Buddhism, highlighting its relevance and potential in contemporary times. With its focus on the philosophy of compassion, sympathy and mutual understanding.

The summit offers a unique perspective on how to deal with the pressing global challenges we face today. Through its carefully curated themes and roundtable conferences, the summit aims to create a platform for Buddhist leaders, Monks, and interfaith dialogue scholars to engage in meaningful discourse and explore ways to address common concerns.

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


What the Indian Prime Minister Said

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

Murals depicting SL Buddhist civilization unveiled in New Delhi







These two historical events that occurred in the 3rd century BCE marked the commencement of Buddhist civilization in Sri Lanka

Marking the 75th anniversary of the establishment of Indo-Lanka diplomatic relations, which falls this year, two photographs of Arahat Mahinda and Theri Sangamitta were unveiled at the office of the State Minister of External Affairs and Culture of India at the National Gallery of Modern Art in New Delhi, a statement from the Sri Lankan Embassy said.

The photographs, which were installed at the office of the State Minister of External Affairs and Culture Smt. Meenakahi Lekhi, feature two murals painted by the eminent Sri Lankan painter Solias Mendis in the Kelaniya Rajamaha Vihara.

The first mural depicts Arabat Mahinda, delivering the message of the Buddha to King Devanampiyatissa upon arriving in Sri Lanka. The second mural depicts the arrival to Sri Lanka of Theri Sanghamitta, bearing the right-hand branch sapling of the Sri Maha Bodhi tree.

These two historical events that occurred in the 3rd century BCE marked the commencement of Buddhist civilization in Sri Lanka and epitomize the strong and unbreakable civilizational bonds that exist between Sri Lanka and India.

The photographs were ceremonially unveiled by State Minister Sml. Meenakshi Lekhi and Sri Lanka's High Commissioner to India Milinda Moragoda in the presence of the Venerable members of the Maha Sangha from Sri Lanka led by the Most Venerable Waskaduwe. Mahindawansa Maha Nayaka Thera who were in New Deihi to attend the Global Buddhist Summit.

Director General of the Department of Archaeology of Sri Lanka Prof. Anura Manatunga, Director General of the International Buddhist Confederation Abhijit Halder and senior officials of the High Commission of Sri Lanka in New Delhi were also present on this occasion. Prof. Manatunga gave a brief description of the temple murals depicted in the photographs at the unveiling ceremony.

Previously, in October 2021, the High Commission of Sr. Lanka in New Delhi presented two photographs depicting the same murals, to be installed at the newly inaugurated international airport in Kushinagar. Similar photographs were installed at the Reshtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) Headquarters in Nagpur in February 2022, and at the Ahmedabad International Airport in July 2022. As part of an ongoing programme to delebrate the 75th anniversary of Indo-Lanka diplomatic relations, action has also been initiated to install similar photographs at other locations in India, including at the international airports in Buddha Gaya and Varanasi shortly, enhancing Sri Lanka's cultural footprint at the level of the States of the Union of India.

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

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
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
Unveiling the historice first Global Buddhist Summit in New Delhi: Rediscovering India's rich legacy and reclaiming an ancient mandate

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Conventional wisdom has a habit of attributing a fair share of the world's evils to religion. This social institution, which is supposedly premised on faith and thrives on unquestioning obedience of its doctrines, is seen as an anathema to scientific and rational thinking. Thus, the proposition that religious ideas can come to the succour of a troubled world should appear as a paradox to the ardent votaries of secularism.

Traditional Indian thinking, however, holds an altogether different view in this regard. The world as such, is primarily governed by ideas. Every dimension of human existence, be it social, political, economical or ethical, needs a set of guiding principles in order to smoothly transact the businesses of life. In recent past, many a belief system which gained international prominence and significantly influenced a large section of thinking minds, promised to change the world. Religion was described as \$\varepsilon\$ Join to whatsapp news intellectuals were trained to regard it as the very antithesis of scientific unitarity and profit became fashionable to ridicule faith and scorn spirituality. The prophesied social revolution never came to pass and the ideologies in question, along with their grandiose claims were

subsequently consigned to the scrap heap of history. Yet, a serious damage that they had inflicted on the collective consciousness of the human mind remained unrepaired. A sizeable fraction of the human race was induced to alienate itself from its innate religiosity. Nevertheless, as evinced by history, no individual or society can survive indefinitely in an atmosphere of absolute materialism. The spiritual vacuum that is becoming increasingly conspicuous all over the world today will not be there for long. An intensely authoritarian and dogmatic ideology can soon take over and transform the familiar world of ours beyond recognition. In that case, the world will no more remain so free and liberal as it is today. There is no surety, that this is not the picture of tomorrow.

Twenty-first Century, is a strange epoch in the history of the mankind. It is so far the best and yet the worst of times. On one hand, scientific and technological advancement has brought every form of luxury and comfort within the reach of modern man and yet various forms of environmental crises are threatening the very existence of the planet. Machines have begun to think like intelligent human beings while young men and women are losing interest in life and sinking in the abyss of despair. Medieval barbarism is baring its fangs to sophisticated and yet impotent civilizations. Leaders and intellectuals are prioritizing political correctness over the truth. A moral, ethical and spiritual paralysis is fast spreading all over the world. We are in urgent need of a sharp and suitable medicine.

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
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India taking new initiatives based on Buddha's teachings: PM Modi



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
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
Unveiling the historice first Global Buddhist Summit in New Delhi: Rediscovering India's rich legacy and reclaiming an ancient mandate


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Conventional wisdom has a habit of attributing a fair share of the world's evils to religion. This social institution, which is supposedly premised on faith and thrives on unquestioning obedience of its doctrines, is seen as an anathema to scientific and rational thinking. Thus, the proposition that religious ideas can come to the succour of a troubled world should appear as a paradox to the ardent votaries of secularism.

Traditional Indian thinking, however, holds an altogether different view in this regard. Dharma, the Indian equivalent of the term Religion, is derived from the Sanskrit root word Dhri, which means to hold together. Thus, Dharma is that which holds. It is the ethical, moral and spiritual glue that holds the society together and prevents it from dissolving into chaos. India, from time antiquity, has been the cradle of lofty religious and spiritual ideas that have served as guiding lights to humankind afflicted with myriad miseries of existence. Of these ideas or Dharmas, undoubtedly the most impactful, in terms of its adherents, has been the message of Lord Buddha. From the freezing snows of Siberia to the lush forests of Sri Lanka, from the arid steppes of Central Asia to the picturesque islands of Japan, about one third of the human race have, for centuries, lived and died under the tenets of the great sage from India.

The doctrine of Gautama Buddha, in many ways does not conform to the standard definition of a religion. Within the core concepts of Buddhism there is no provision of the God. Buddha spoke of no heaven, hell or afterlife. As a matter of fact, he sidetracked metaphysics altogether. The sole concern of the enlightened one was the alleviation of misery. It was this tireless quest for the answer to miseries of life which brought enlightenment to Prince Siddhartha and transformed him into the Buddha. The truth that he had realized some six centuries before the birth of Christ, came to constitute the essence of his religion. Ever since Buddha promulgated his formula of cessation of Dukkha (misery), countless souls, from murderous highwaymen to contrite Emperors, have sought refuge in the Buddha, Sangha and the Dharma, the three jewels of Buddhism and have conducted themselves from darkness to light.

The world as such, is primarily governed by ideas. Every dimension of human existence, be it social, political, economical or ethical, needs a set of guiding principles in order to smoothly transact the businesses of life. In recent past, many a belief system which gained international prominence and significantly influenced a large section of thinking minds, promised to change the world. Religion was described as a sound to what sappnews to intellectuals were trained to regard it as the very antithesis or scientific uninking and pick. It became fashionable to ridicule faith and scorn spirituality. The prophesied social revolution never came to pass and the ideologies in question, along with their grandiose claims were

subsequently consigned to the scrap heap of history. Yet, a serious damage that they had inflicted on the collective consciousness of the human mind remained unrepaired. A sizeable fraction of the human race was induced to alienate itself from its innate religiosity. Nevertheless, as evinced by history, no individual or society can survive indefinitely in an atmosphere of absolute materialism. The spiritual vacuum that is becoming increasingly conspicuous all over the world today will not be there for long. An intensely authoritarian and dogmatic ideology can soon take over and transform the familiar world of ours beyond recognition. In that case, the world will no more remain so free and liberal as it is today. There is no surety, that this is not the picture of tomorrow.

Twenty-first Century, is a strange epoch in the history of the mankind. It is so far the best and yet the worst of times. On one hand, scientific and technological advancement has brought every form of luxury and comfort within the reach of modern man and yet various forms of environmental crises are threatening the very existence of the planet. Machines have begun to think like intelligent human beings while young men and women are losing interest in life and sinking in the abyss of despair. Medieval barbarism is baring its fangs to sophisticated and yet impotent civilizations. Leaders and intellectuals are prioritizing political correctness over the truth. A moral, ethical and spiritual paralysis is fast spreading all over the world. We are in urgent need of a sharp and suitable medicine.

It was this imperative that was operational behind the convention of the first Global Buddhist Summit in New Delhi on 20-21 April 2023. This grand event was organized in tradition of the Buddhist councils that were convened in ancient India under the patronage of emperors like Ajatasatru Kalashoka, Ashoka and Kanishka etc. Addressing the inaugural session of the convention, the Indian Prime Minister Mr. Narendra Modi spoke about the relevance of Buddha's teachings as regards the problems that plague the world today. He also explained how India, in pursuance of Buddhist ideals, have always strove to harmonize her own interests with those of the entire world. What Mr. Modi was actually elaborating upon was the Mahayana Buddhist ideal of Bodhisattva. According to this philosophy, the enlightened soul, in the Bodhisattva state of existence, forsakes his own salvation for the emancipation of his fellow sentient beings. As a nation, India has indeed steadfastly remained true to this ideal. As if under the mandate of a mysterious principle of eternal recurrence, the stage is once again set for India to assume the leadership role in the global Buddhist discourse. As the confused world reels between the Scylla of absolute spiritual anomie and the Charyhdie of dogmatic fanaticism, it is the most appropriate time to reacc JOIN TO WHATSAPP NEWS of the middle path of the Buddha. So let us revive the glorious heritage of Dharr Nagarjuna, Dipankara and other illustrious Buddhist masters of yore. Only a fraction of their

India is progressing by following Buddha's teachings, says PM Modi

India, in the last nine years, has been making big strides following Buddha teachings, said Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Thursday.

Speaking at Global Buddhist Summit 2023 in New Delhi, Modi said that India has followed Buddha's teachings including the path of Theory, Practice and Realisation. India has progressed rapidly on all these three points.

The Global Buddhist Summit is being held at a time when India is celebrating 75 years of her independence when India is celebrating the 'Amrit Mahotsav'.

"India is moving ahead in the 'Amrit Kaal' towards becoming a developed country. India has resolved for the welfare of not only India but also for the whole wide world," PM Modi said.

"We can embrace happiness only if we renunciate realisations of Victory, Defeats, Fights, Wars. Lord Buddha has taught the path to overcome these. Enmity cannot vanish with enmity but with Love. Actual happiness lies in peace, in living together with peace," he said.

If we want to make the world happy, then this Buddha's mantra of inclusiveness is the only way by leaving the self, the world, and narrow thinking, he said.

Prime Minister also mentioned the Russia-Ukraine war in his speech.

"The path of Buddha is the path of the future, the path of sustainability. If the world had followed the teachings of Buddha, then even a crisis like a climate change would not have come in front of us. This crisis came about because, in the last century, some countries did not think about others, about future generations," he said.

Be it peace missions in different countries of the world or a calamity like an earthquake in Turkey... India stands with humanity in times of every crisis, with 'Mum Bhav', by putting its full potential, he said. (ANI)

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India being peacemaker, should get permanent COLOMBO seat in UNSC: Padma awardee Thurman

Supporting India's candidature for a permanent seat in the United Nations Security Council, Professor Robert AF Thurman, Co-founder and President of the Tibet House in New York, said that the five permanent members of the UNSC are unable to resolve conflicts diplomatically and engaged in wars while India has the potential to bring peace in the world.

He Said, "Today in the United Nations, the five permanent security council members are the five big arms dealers on the planet so they naturally will not make peace and that has to change for example India, a huge country should be in the permanent member of the Security Council. Brazil, you know, Germany, Japan and not just the five people who think they won the world war."

He asserted that India has every right to be the centre for the congregation of all the Buddhists as it has been following the principle of non-violence and shown the path of peace to the world rather than the war which some countries have been adopting to invade another country.

He is also a recipient of India's Padma Shri Award.

Terming India as the land of Lord Buddha, Lord Mahavira and Mahatma Gandhi, Professor Robert AF Thurman said that India has been promoting peace through Buddhism.

"Well, I see it in the terms that Prime Minister Narendra Modi laid out earlier yesterday where he mentioned that India has the principle of non-violence and peace rather than war or as many countries, their major effort or expense is defence and which they call it defence and then one of them invades another country for eg United States foolishly invaded Iraq the second time and Afghanistan occupied."

He went on to say that attacking the enemy in another country to defend your country is admissible but to invade a country or occupy the country is "terrible".

He said, "They (US) had a right to attack their enemies in Afghanistan who bombed in New York but after that to occupy a country was a terrible mistake as obviously...and now Russia has invaded Ukraine and that is really terrible,"He made the remarks as he came to attend the Global Buddhist Summit in New Delhi.

The two-day summit is being hosted by the Ministry of Culture in collaboration with International Buddhist Confederation (IBC). The theme of the Global Buddhist Summit is 'Responses to Contemporary Challenges: Philosophy to Praxis.'

He said that India is a land where Buddha took birth and it has every right to be the centre to assemble all the Buddhists. Speaking to ANI, he said, "India has never done an invasion

on anybody not perfect of course but they had to defend themselves of course on the other hand and so India has a right because of Gandhi, Buddha, Mahavira, Jains to say non-violence is the principle of the country and that makes sense. And also it happens to be the land on the subcontinent where Buddha took birth although the modern country of India ofcourse didn't exist at that time, there were many small countries. So, they have every right to be the centre to assemble all the Buddhists and to stand for the principle and even not to give up the hope that the world can be the world at peace."

Speaking about the Dalai Lama's remarks at the Global Buddhist Summit, he said, "His Holiness The Dalai Lama who also blessed this conference enormously by coming today. He always says and has been saying for 30 years that the 20th century was the century of terrible violence as the world wars marked the end of colonialism worldwide and the 21st century has to be a century of peace. Unfortunately, in the first 23 years of this century, there have been terrible wars and the US is guilty to some extent and my country (US) is guilty of unprovoked wars."

He said that every person in the world needs freedom and called India a free country. He said, "Freedom is a thing that people need, that is what human people need, human beings need. India is a free country, a bit chaotic like the US is, but we have to be partners in seeing that the whole planet is like that."

Responding to a question regarding China following expansionist policy, he termed dictatorship dangerous as the dictator has to suppress their own people but the Chinese nationals like freedom.

"Well, you see that the danger of dictatorship is that the dictator has to suppress their own people because it is not true that Chinese people are not the same human beings who do not like freedom because they are. There are some theories.... that Chinese people don't want democracy and they pretend some Western... or some nonsense like that. Actually, Chinese people are just people and every people even in a family like to be free," he told ANI.

"They don't want to be completely under one person and also their talent can't come out unless they are free and they won't be creative...So, the point is I see that dictatorships are dangerous because their own people resent being bossed around by the dictator. So, the dictator has to push that there is an enemy out there, they try to deflect resentment of the people against them, against some foreigner and they awake a war and that is an age-old principle that people that everyone can observe in history. So, we don't need governance where people can have their say right at home and if you are free to say it, they will disagree, and there will maybe be local squabbles and fights because humans are like that. But, overall they are not estranged to an enemy, to a neighbour that's really important," he added.

He emphasized that Buddhism can play a part in spreading peace and harmony in the world.

"Budthism can do that, Dalai Lama has a slogan in which he says 'world peace through innerpeace' which means that if people learn to control themselves and be friendly and loving and peaceful with each other. Then, they won't have violence and conflict." Professor Robet AF Thurman further said that if the world sees other people of the world as a family, then there would get along and will not have issues with each other. (ANI)

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
